Although the unemployment rate has risen again in the month of October both our Labour force and our total number of employed is higher than the same time last year. It should be noted that it was recently released by Statistics Canada that the sample size for the Labour force survey is 500 households in the Windsor CMA. Youth unemployment has climbed to 23.9%. There have been several initiatives launched within the last 2 months aimed at tackling this number, and we anticipate to start seeing the results in the Labour force shortly.

Fiat Chrysler announced the hiring of 800 workers coming after the recent plant upgrades that invested 2 Billion into their Windsor facilities. Ikea has announced that they will open a store in Windsor for pick-up's and ordering. The furniture giant says that it will bring 35 new jobs to the region. Greco Aluminum Railings announced they would hire 27 new employees at its Windsor location. Highbury Canco, the company that began operations in the previous Heinz food processing factory of Leamington will be adding 30 new employees after opening up some new production lines. Ground effects, an auto parts maker has begun a partnership with the Provincial government through the southwestern development fund. It will create 31 new jobs.

**Toronto, October 8, 2015** – Housing starts in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) were trending up at 1,132 units in September compared to 997 in August, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) 1 of housing starts.

"Housing starts trended up for the fifth consecutive month in September. Greater job growth in Windsor this year, mortgage rates at historical lows and a shortage of listings in the resale market relative to demand has led to greater demand for new homes," said Anthony Passarelli, Senior Market Analyst with CMHC.

CMHC uses the trend measure as a complement to the monthly SAAR of housing starts to account for considerable swings in monthly estimates and obtain a more complete picture of the state of the housing market. In some situations, analysing only SAAR data can be misleading in some markets, as they are largely driven by the multiples segment of the markets which can be quite variable from one month to the next.

The monthly SAAR of total starts was 1,115 units in September, down from 1,806 in August, primarily due to 780 annualized apartment starts in August and none in September. Months in which there are no apartment starts are not unusual in Windsor. Single-detached starts were also down, while row and semi-detached home starts were higher in September.
