The unemployment rate in the Windsor CMA rose very slightly to 7.3% in March. The decrease in the number of people employed was larger than decrease in the size of the labour force, causing the increase in the unemployment rate. Looking at unadjusted numbers, the youth unemployment rate declined from 17.1% in February to 16.4% in March.

Hiram Walker & Sons announced the planned production expansion and upgrading of its facility in Windsor. The project will enable seasonal workers to work year-round and is expected to create additional jobs. No specific job figures were released. A new Tim Hortons restaurant opened in Harrow, creating 35 to 40 jobs. CapsCanada is expanding its K-CAPS manufacturing line with a new state of the art facility. The \$25 million investment will result in the addition of 34 jobs. Accucaps officially opened its new \$5 million specialty products suite which will employ 20 people in production and research and development when it is fully operational.

Housing starts in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) were trending at 724 units in March compared to 752 units in February, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) of housing starts.

"Housing starts trended marginally lower in March, but remained close to 700 in the first quarter. Housing starts were supported by slight employment gains and a slowly growing population," said Erica McLerie, CMHC's Senior Market Analyst for Windsor.
