The unemployment rate in the Windsor CMA dropped slightly from May to June and is now below the provincial average. The number of people employed decreased, as did the size of the labour force but both are at higher levels compared to the previous year. The manufacturing sector showed some job growth over the past month, adding almost 2,000 people to the May total of 38,300. Most other sectors had fairly steady employment numbers. The youth unemployment rate dropped very slightly from May to June.

Several permits for large construction projects were issued in June including an industrial project in Amherstburg, \$1.1 million in renovations on a Main Street East commercial building in Kingsville and a \$1.2 million renovation project on a Tecumseh industrial building on 6th Concession. Renovation projects at Riverside and Vincent Massey Secondary Schools and Westview Freedom Academy topped the list of Windsor projects. Work also continued on the Walker Power Building on Devonshire Road at Riverside Drive.
