An increase in the size of the labour force, combined with a smaller increase in the number of people employed, resulting in an increase in the unemployment rate from 9.4% in January to 9.6% in February. The unemployment rate is also substantially higher than it was one year ago; however, this is not due to a decrease in the number people with jobs. It is due to an increase in the size of the labour force. In fact, there are 6,500 more people with jobs in the Windsor CMA than there were in February 2014. There was a very slight increase in the youth unemployment rate from 14% to 14.1%.

Housing starts in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) were trending at 744 units in February compared to 845 units in January, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) of housing starts. The standalone monthly SAAR was 244 units in February, down from 793 in January.

"Housing starts trended lower in February but it was not unexpected given the extreme winter conditions last month. Employment and mortgage rates continued to support new housing demand, so the drop in starts mainly reflected the unusual weather," said Margot Stevenson, CMHC's Senior Market Analyst for Windsor.

Industrial and commercial construction continued at a stronger pace in 2015 than in 2014, with year-to-date institutional construction trending higher as well. Industrial construction values are particularly high with building permits being issued for a 40,000 square foot building and the expansion of a transportation/logistics company, both in Leamington. The City of Windsor saw the start of a number of industrial construction projects as well, including an addition and renovations as part of the retooling project at the Fiat Chrysler Windsor Assembly Plant. A permit was also issued for two additions totaling almost 22,000 square feet at an industrial building in west Windsor. On the commercial side, permits were issued for renovations at a stand-alone building at the Tecumseh Mall property and for a new retail store to house M.R. Meat Market and Joseph's Produce on Tecumseh Road in Windsor.
