The Windsor Census Metropolitan Area experienced an increase of 0.3 percentage points in its unemployment rate from March to April caused by a slight increase in the size of the labour force and similar decrease in the number of people employed. Employment in manufacturing decreased from March to April while health care and social assistance employment increased. The unadjusted youth unemployment rate rose slightly, from 15.3% to 15.9%
