The unemployment rate rose from July to August 2014, despite an increase in the number of people employed, due to a larger increase in the size of the labour force. Employment in manufacturing rose very slightly from July to August, along with increases in the trade, health care and social assistance and public administration sectors. The youth unemployment rate dropped from 20% to 18% as the number of youth employed rose by approximately 600 people.

Housing starts in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) were trending at 808 units in August compared to 777 units in July, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) of housing starts.

"The housing starts trend continued to move higher in August due to stronger construction of semi-detached and townhome units. Starts in the first eight months of 2014 are 19 per cent higher than in the same period of 2013 due to the stronger demand for single-detached and semi-detached homes," said Erica McLerie, Senior Market Analyst with CMHC.
