The completion of the retooling project at FCA's Windsor Assembly Plant and the return to work of approximately 5,000 direct employees and another 1,000 employees at feeder plants undoubtedly had an impact on the June employment figures. Since the figures in the tables above represent a three month moving average, the shutdown may continue to have some influence on the July numbers. In comparison to June 2014, both the labour force and the number of people employed increased by 11%.

Housing starts in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) were trending up slightly at 699 units in June compared to 682 in May, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) of housing starts.

"Row home starts trended up, while starts of all other dwelling types were stable. The growing population 55 years of age and older has supported demand for new row homes in Windsor CMA. They are primarily designed to attract households that wish to downsize to a lower maintenance home and live in areas bordering or on the outer edges of the City of Windsor," said Anthony Passarelli, Senior Market Analyst with CMHC.

The City also issued a permit for a \$1.2 million addition to E.J. Lajeunesse Secondary School.
