The Windsor CMA saw some large drops in unemployment to start 2016. Moving from the highest ranked location for unemployment in the country, to 8th. We know that there has been a large number of job gains in the region with our manufacturing sector ramping up and beginning to feel the benefits of a dramatically low Canadian dollar.

The largest gains seen this month however, were not in Manufacturing but instead were found in Accommodation and Food Service which added 2,000 jobs. Educational services and Professional, Scientific and Technical services also added 900 and 600 jobs respectively. The always stubborn youth unemployment rate also took a dive and is sitting at 16.8% down from close to 25% at the beginning of the year.

It should be noted that large jumps in employment data are not always a result of an actual large increase. Statistics Canada only surveys around 500 households in the Windsor CMA to get sample data for these numbers. It is also done as a 3 month moving average to help with accuracy. That being said, it is within the realm of statistical anomaly that these numbers aren't a fully accurate picture of our labour force. The same can be said for any direction the numbers move in. Within 3 months' time we will know whether or not the decrease in unemployment is statistically sound, or a result of the small sample size mixed with other external factors.

Toronto, March 8, 2016 – The housing starts trend in the Windsor Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) was 1,146 units in February compared to 1,257 in January, according to Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC). The trend is a six month moving average of the monthly seasonally adjusted annual rates (SAAR) of housing starts.

"The trend in Windsor CMA total housing starts was down in February 2016 compared to the previous month, due to weaker multi-unit starts. The increase in single-detached housing starts was not enough to completely offset the decline in multi-unit housing starts," said Anthony Passarelli, Senior Market Analyst with CMHC.

CMHC uses the trend measure as a complement to the monthly SAAR of housing starts to account for considerable swings in monthly estimates and obtain a more complete picture of the state of the housing market. In some situations, analysing only SAAR data can be misleading in some markets, as they are largely driven by the multiples segment of the markets which can be quite variable from one month to the next.

- The monthly SAAR of total starts was 1,143 units in February, up from 1,084 in January. The February increase in the SAAR measure of housing starts was driven by an increase in single-detached and row starts. In the first two months of 2016, the actual number of single-detached starts reached 75 units compared to 33 reported for the same period last year.
